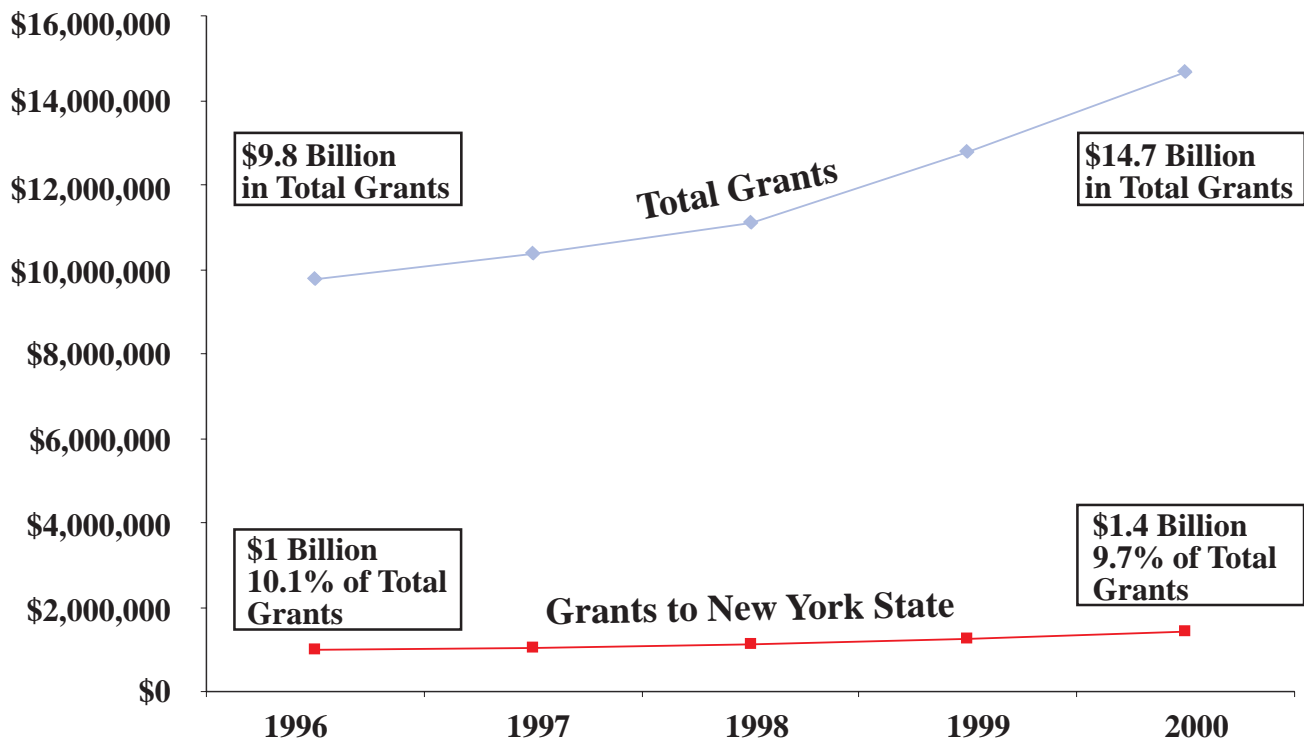


The Facts About... National Health Research Funding in New York

(thousands of dollars)

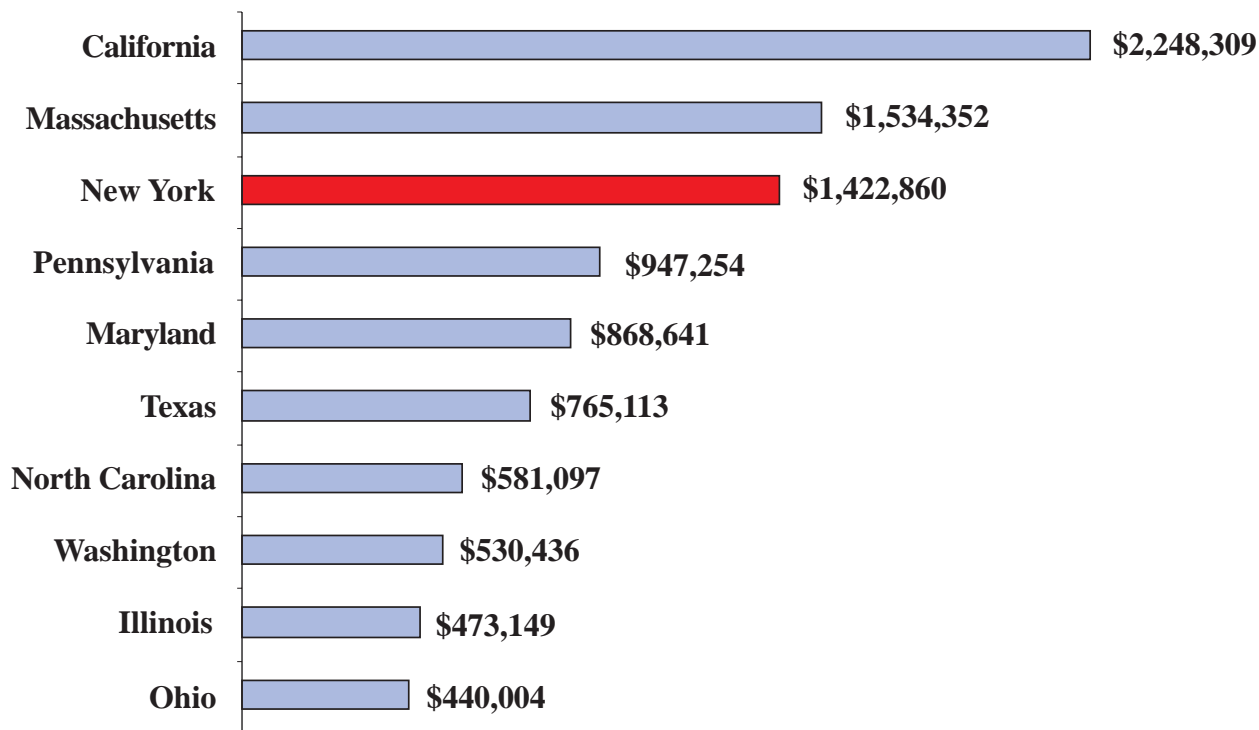

In 1999, an estimated \$20.1 billion was spent on health-care research in the United States, according to the [Health Care Financing Administration](#). This amount did not include research and development expenditures by drug companies and other manufacturers and providers of medical equipment and supplies. One of the most frequently cited health-care expenditures on research is the funding provided by the the nation's principal health research agency, the [National Institutes of Health](#). Most of its financing supports biomedical and behavioral research in order to acquire new knowledge to help prevent, diagnose and treat human diseases and disabilities. New York State's hospitals and other research facilities received about 9.7% of the federal agency's total in 2000.

FY 2000 (thousands of dollars)**



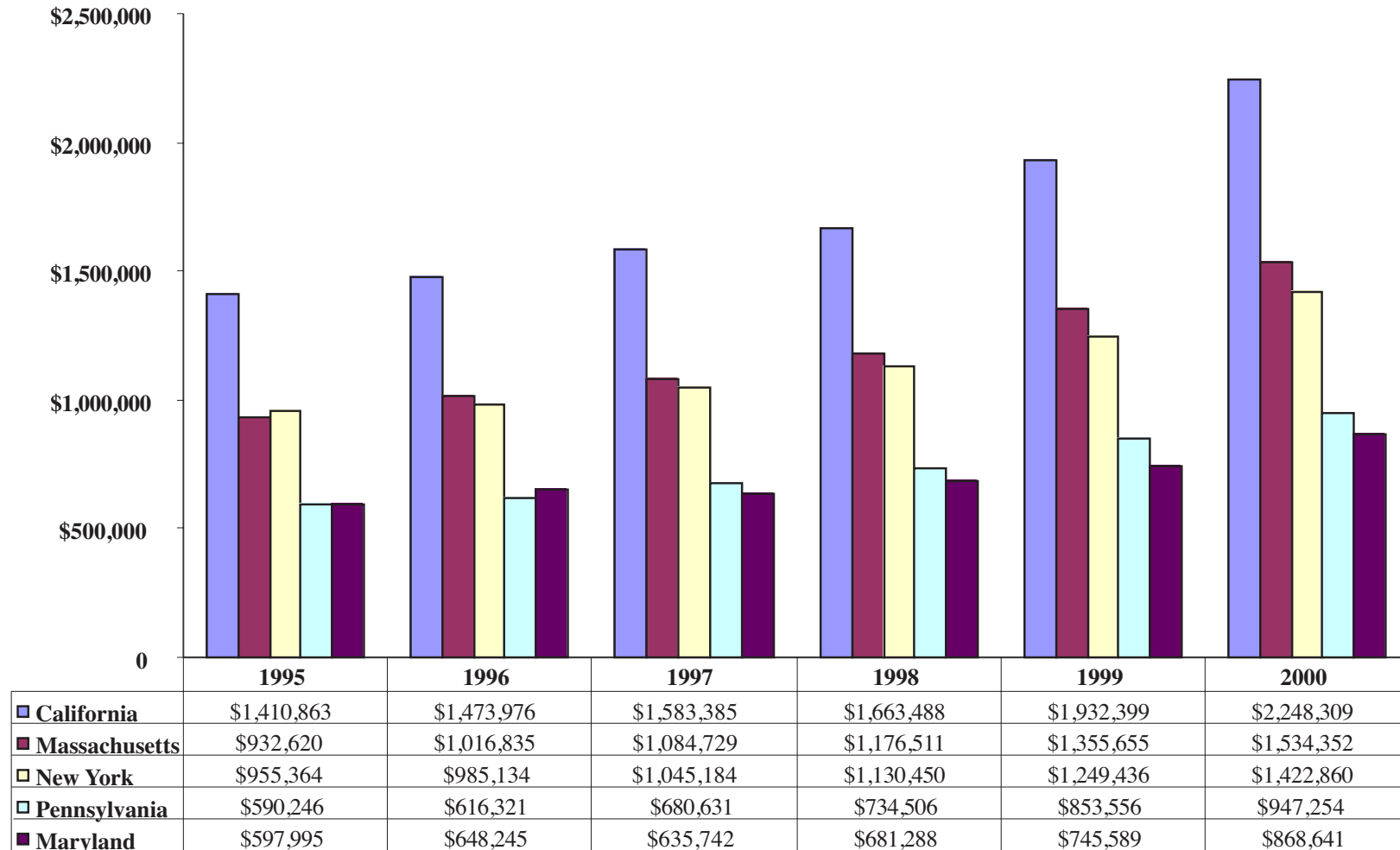

Over the past two decades, the proportion of federal research dollars coming into New York State relative to competing states has declined, although overall funding for research has risen. New York slipped into second place in the rankings in 1996, behind Massachusetts.
