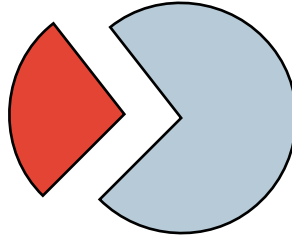

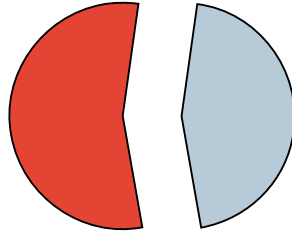
The Concentration of Health-Care Spending on Americans

1% of Americans Consume 27%



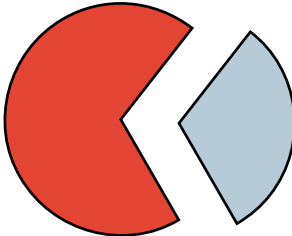
of U.S. Health-Care Dollars.

5% of Americans Consume 55%



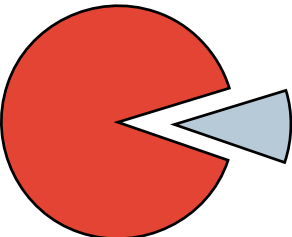
of U.S. Health-Care Dollars.

More than half of U.S. health-care spending is for treatments consumed by 5% of the population with high-cost illnesses and injuries, according to a study of 1996 expenditures published in *Health Affairs*. Similar concentration levels of expenditures were found in studies of spending patterns since 1928. An estimated 46.3% of the highest consumers of health-care services were the elderly.
